CHURCHILL SPEECH AND DEBATE TOURNAMENT 2020

The Churchill Speech and Debate 2020 Competitions were held December 5. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic this event was run for the first time via a meeting software, which brought a large field of competitors. A record 55 teams from 21 High Schools entered the debate tournament. Only one school sent speech competitors, apparently because competitive speech had largely fallen victim to pandemic restrictions in the other schools that usually supply contestants.

Our Director of Competitions Ms. Navya Baradi and organizers from the University of Alberta Debate Society planned well and kept the day on course. UADS partners with us in staging this tournament as an outreach to high school students. The tournament and finals took place in one day. UADS provided volunteer judges for the debates, and the Churchill Society provided volunteer judges for speech.

The tournament debate topic was:

"In times of conflict, this house believes that leaders should prioritize keeping the peace over keeping the public informed."

The prescribed speech tournament topic was:

"How do you think social media, as it exists today, might have influenced the outcome of World War II? Consider the implications of modern social media on strategies used by WWII leader like Winston Churchill."

The topic for the impromptu speech round was:

"Following the end of major crises such as WWII there were tremendous celebrations at the end of the crisis; what will you do in celebration once the COVID-19 pandemic is over?"

Winners of the debate tournament were:

Winners of the Speech tournament, all students from Old Scona Academic, Edmonton, were:



Honourary Patron and former president Robert Dunn provided the following remembrance of Wally and his service to our society:

"I first met Wally and his wife Eileen at the AGM of the society in the fall of 1997. My introduction came through Keith Wakefield who I had the pleasure of working with for a number of years. Previously I attended a number of Churchill Memorial Banquets, my first being in 1989 when Lady Soames was the guest speaker on the singular occasion of the unveiling of the statue of Churchill in Churchill Square. Our memorial banquets were deliberately fashioned after a formal mess dinner by the founders. All of the society's founders were veterans and the society deliberately established ongoing relations with regular force and volunteer regiments based in Edmonton.

Going forward to 1997, I was invited to the society's AGM by Keith Wakefield and in the course of the evening was persuaded to take on the role of President. Although my vision of the society going forward was 'slightly' at odds with Wally's, to his irritation, - over the next twenty odd years he and I became very good friends.

During Wally's professional career it was expected that businessmen in the community be engaged in worthy causes. Before the internet, in-person social networking was an absolute necessity and largely took the form of participating in and supporting charitable organizations and associations such as the Red Cross, the United Appeal (today's United Way), the Salvation Army, Volunteer Regiments, and the Chamber of Commerce to name a few. Typically, you did not just engage in one, but many at the same time. And of course, social clubs: the Royal Glenora, the Edmonton Club, the Petroleum Club, etc. Wally

was an exemplary member and supporter of many such organizations. He also chaired the opening and closing ceremonies of the Commonwealth Games in 1978.

Not the least of his contributions to our community was his participation in our own Rt. Hon. Sir Winston S. Churchill Society. Wally served in virtually all offices of the society, being at various times president, banquet chair, treasurer, and lastly secretary until his retirement in 2005. He worked tirelessly on many projects for the society. To his credit and our benefit, he was able to physically maintain the archives of the society, for a long time keeping all the bits and pieces of the society's remarkable history (speaker portraits, speaker recording, books, and mementos) in his own storage space where his insurance office was located downtown. At every banquet he devoted himself to assembling materials, portraits, and memorabilia for display. Most notably, Wally was the inspiration for the project resulting in the publication of the society's two volumes of the Heroic Memory to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the society. He came up with both the idea and the title and put an enormous amount of time and energy into its distribution to school and public libraries across Alberta. Wally also assisted in the realization of the society's ambition to erect a statue of Churchill in Churchill Square under the auspices of the Churchill Statue and Oxford Scholarship Foundation. He organized and managed many casinos, ultimately serving as the chair of the foundation until his passing. He will be missed."

The Rt. Hon. Sir Winston Spencer Churchill Society recognizes and cherishes Wally's long and excellent service. He is remembered with affection and respect. We offer heartfelt condolences to Wally's family.

HISTORICAL EVENTS

- 1900 Churchill begins his first lecture tour of North America in December. He spends Christmas in Ottawa.
- 1905 Churchill is appointed Under-Secretary of State at the Colonial Office.
- 1923 Having lost his Dundee seat a year earlier, Churchill fails to get elected in West Leicester in the December general election.
- 1929 On a speaking tour of North America, Churchill is in New York for the stock market crash on October 29.
- 1930 Winston publishes "My Early Life", an account of his life up to 1902. The 1972 film "Young Winston" was based on this book.

Her family in Uganda lost everything and could not support her education. The British government covered her tuition, allowing her to complete her Honours degree in Clinical Biology. She had met fellow exile and student Zahir Lakhai, who was able to complete his degree in Medicine at the University of Leeds. They married in Leeds in 1977.

Zaheer was accepted for post graduate studies at the University of Alberta, and the Lakhanis came to Canada. Salma operated a business involved in early childhood education. Dr. Zaheer Lakhani established a career in Cardiology. They have both been active in the Edmonton and Alberta community. Her Honour has served in and directed an impressive list of community and education-oriented charities and programs. The Sir Winston Churchill Society is well known to Their Honours: Dr. Zaheer Lakhani served on our board of directors in the early 2000s.

Our Board of Directors and officers are honoured and grateful for this vice-regal recognition. From our hearts, on behalf of our membership, we enthusiastically welcome Their Honours to our society and look forward to fruitful collaboration with them.

Originality

Students show creative thinking through the argumentation. It is clear that the student conducted research and developed insightful remarks about the topic.

Persuasiveness

The paper is identifiable as a persuasive essay and the stance taken is clearly understood. Students present astute evidence to convince the reader of the assertion. There must be a coherent argument made in the paper.

Polish

Students present a high level of work with no spelling or grammatical errors. The language is to be formal without any loss of ease of reading. The paper has no formatting errors and is presented in an effective way.
